





Career and Technical Education


At the secondary level, CTE is delivered through comprehensive high schools and CTE high schools. At the postsecondary level, CTE is delivered through the state's technology centers, which provide 2-year and certificate-level occupational and technical training programs, and community colleges.⁸



Secondary CTE Enrollment, FY 20149




Postsecondary CTE Enrollment, FY 20149




Career Clusters


